History of School

Rapids Landing Primary School opened at the beginning of 2018 as an Independent Public School catering for Kindergarten to Year 6 students. Rapids Landing Primary School is proud to be the first government primary school to open its doors in Margaret River since 1909. Our core purpose is in educating and ensuring every student has the opportunity to be the best they can be. We have worked closely with our local community to develop this purpose and the direction for our new school to ensure it reflects the aspirations, uniqueness and diversity of our school community and students.

The school has state of the art facilities and resources to cater for teaching and learning in the 21st century. Classrooms have stylish, modern furniture that meets the cooperative nature of today's learning environments. Situated on beautifully landscaped grounds, the campus comprises a range of modern buildings including an on-site Kindergarten, 2 Pre-primary Centres, 12 primary classrooms, a library resource centre, an art and science room, music and drama room, administration block, covered assembly with an activity area and canteen that is ready to provide nutritious food to fuel eager learners when student numbers make this viable.

Rapid Landing School operated from 1925 to 1927 and was situated approximately 1km from our current school site. This school taught students of all ages who lived in the Group 23 settlement. The developers added an "s" to Rapid as Rapids connects to the water flowing in Darch Brook, a nearby river.

Rapids Landing Primary School is located on Tonkin Boulevard, named after Sir John Tonkin (Western Australia premier, 1971-1974). Sir John Tonkin was one of the first teachers at the original site.

Whilst Rapids Landing Primary may be a new school, it certainly has strong links to the past and surrounding area.

During learning, students may engage in physical breaks and Crunch 'n Sip alongside their teacher.

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School Hours and Break Times (continued)

To ensure the safety of children at all times, they should not arrive at school prior to 8.35am. Students enter and exit via gate access. Students arriving prior to 8.35am must sit on the benches in the courtyard. From 8.35am when the signal is played over the school PA, students are encouraged to prepare for their day in their classrooms.

Students need to arrive at school in time to organise their personal belongings prior to the start of learning. This will ensure a positive and smooth start to the school day.

All students not involved in after school activities are expected to leave the school grounds at 3.10pm unless special arrangements have been made by parents, carers or teachers. If an emergency occurs and you will be more than 10 minutes late, please phone the school so that your child will not be worried or unsettled and supervision arrangements can be made.

Kindergarten

We have an onsite Kindergarten program in Three Bears. Students turning four by 30 June in the year they are attending can access this program 15 hours per week, 5 days per fortnight. Parents and carers of Kindergarten students receive a specific handbook outlining various aspects of the Kindergarten program.


Pre-Primary

Administration

Enrolling at Rapids Landing Primary School

Rapids Landing Primary School adheres to the Department of Education's Enrolment Policy. This policy clearly outlines eligibility requirements as listed below:

Resident in the local area: The School Education Act 1999 guarantees a place for every child in the compulsory years of school, Pre-Primary – Year 6, at their local school.

A birth certificate or extract of birth or passport must accompany the Application for Enrolment. Students will be placed in the year of study corresponding to their age group.

Parents of students with Special Needs are asked to contact the school to discuss these needs when the Application for Enrolment has been approved to ensure that the most appropriate program is in place to meet their needs. Please also identify Medical Needs so that we can provide a safe learning environment.

Students who were born overseas must hold the appropriate visa before applying to the school. For overseas students who are entering Australia using an entry visa it is necessary that the office sight the passport and visa of the parent (primary visa holder) and student at the time of Application for Enrolment.

For all visa enquiries please contact Education and Training International on 08 9218 2100 or email study.eti@dtwd.wa.gov.au.

The school must sight a copy of each student's immunisation records at the time of Application for Enrolment.

School Areas

Margaret River region schools are local intake schools. All new enrolment applicants will be informed if they are in the Rapids Landing Primary School zone. Special permission must be sought to enrol a child in a school other than in the local area.

Newsletters and School Communication

The school newsletter is emailed fortnightly on Wednesday and updated on our school app. Our newsletter is designed to keep you up to date with current and upcoming events at the school. Hard copies can be collected from the Administration Office, if required.

A term planner is included with the first newsletter of each term and can also be located on our school app. The newsletter also includes information from the Rapids Landing Primary School Board and the P&C. The newsletter is a wonderful way for us to share and celebrate the achievements of your children.

We urge parents and carers to read the newsletters regularly to keep up to-date with what is happening in and around the school. Our Facebook page and SchoolStream app are also used to promote timely communication.

Classroom teachers may also choose to keep in touch with you via letter, phone, email or using apps.





Charges and Voluntary School Contributions

A schedule outlining the Charges and Voluntary School Contributions is provided to all parents and carers two months prior to the start on the next school year. The Department of Education has requested that schools set these charges in consultation with the School Board. The Charges and Voluntary School Contributions are due and collected at the beginning of the school year and should be paid directly to the Administration Office. Contributions collected will be used to supplement school expenditure in our curriculum learning areas. These contributions will play an important role in the provision of resources that enable the school to add value to your child's learning experiences. Should you have difficulty paying these amounts, please feel free to discuss the matter with the Manager of Corporate Services, in strict confidence, as it may be possible to arrange a flexible payment plan to suit your situation.

The School Building Fund voluntary donation will be \$20 per student to assist us with the purchase of sheltered walkways for our school. Please note that this amount is tax deductible.

Electronic payments are preferred to minimise the handling of cash. Please email details of your deposit to the Manager of Corporate Services, Ms Chelsea Yates at Chelsea.Yates@educaton.wa.edu.au This will help us ensure your payment is correctly identified and promptly receipted.

If money is sent to school for any purpose, PLEASE place the money in an envelope, write your child's name and class room number on it and the purpose of it.

Please note that the contribution of \$60 per child equates to \$1.50 per week over the school year.

Communicating with the School

Our school acknowledges the concerns of parents and welcomes any questions you may have. We are committed to responding promptly to your enquiries. When you have matters or concerns regarding the school, it is vital that you seek resolution as early as possible to avoid unnecessary stress and anxiety. In the first instance please contact the Principal, classroom teacher or other relevant staff members to discuss your concerns. The best way to do this is to arrange an appointment with the relevant person so that an appropriate amount of time can be devoted to resolving the matter effectively. To avoid disruptions to normal class routine we ask that you arrange meetings with staff in advance. An appointment with the teacher can also be requested via the Administration Office.

Please note that it is inappropriate for parents and carers to deal directly with other students or their caregivers as this can lead to unnecessary conflict between the parties involved.

School Board

The purpose of the School Board is to act ethically and with integrity in the governance of the school within the legislated accountability framework. The School Board Chairperson and Principal form a strong partnership to ensure a positive strategic direction is set by the School Board.

Parents and Citizens' Association

The P&C provides a great opportunity for parents, teachers and community members to support the learning environment and infrastructure of the school. Meetings are generally held twice per term with the sub-committees and an executive committee meeting more regularly to progress work at hand. The Annual General Meeting is held in February. Dates of the meetings are published in the school newsletter, on the school website, SchoolStream app and Facebook page and in the term planner.

A Membership fee of \$1.00 is payable each year and ensures copies of the minutes of each meeting and the right to vote at meetings. A \$20.00 P&C Donation is also requested to support this group add to the school's provision of resources, including play equipping and community events.

The role of the P&C is diverse. Most school P&C Associations significantly contribute to the funding of programs and facilities within the school. Listed below are some of the committees that may be established and the role they play. All committees welcome input from parents and community members.

Buildings and Grounds: Make suggestions, come up with ideas, action improvements or additions to school buildings and grounds. Our P&C has been incredibly proactive with implementing Nature Play.

Events: Initiate social functions to facilitate networking of families within the school community and help organise fundraising events.

Uniform: Coordinate the ordering and sales of school uniforms.

Sport: Support sporting programs within the school by assisting with coaching and motivation of team and individual sports.

Canteen: Coordinate or volunteer to assist with the general running of the school canteen or lunches.



PARENT AND CARER PARTICIPATION

Parent assistance in classroom and with school activities is always very welcome. It gives parents and carers the opportunity to take an active part in class activities and to develop an understanding of how children learn.

If you wish to assist in the class please contact your child's classroom teacher and watch for notes in the school newsletter asking for assistance with special school events.

As our new school grows you are encouraged to be part of the Rapids Landing Primary School P&C Association.

If you are a volunteer on an overnight camp you are required to have a current *Working with Children Check*. Further information about this is available from the Principal.

Teacher - Parent Contact

Informal ongoing contact with class teachers is important at Rapids Landing Primary School. In addition to formal reports at the end of the first and second semester, teachers at Rapids Landing Primary School report informally in a variety of ways including:

- Information sessions about the teaching and learning program
- Parent teacher discussions, that may include Three Way Conferences with the child involved
- Learning Journeys and Progress Packs
- Telephone discussions between teacher and parents/carers
- Annotations in diaries and communication books
- Letters, emails and other forms of correspondence from teachers to advise parents about successes or concerns

Where there is a need to discuss a student's progress, staff will contact parents by phone, email or note to organise a mutually suitable time to meet.

Parent and carer information meetings are held in each class at the beginning of each year. At this meeting teachers will set out their preferable method of communication, eg email, phone or meetings.

Assemblies

School Assemblies are typically held fortnightly on Friday mornings . Parents, carers, grandparents and friends are very welcome to attend these special events.

School assemblies are held to:

- Recognise and celebrate achievements of students, staff, parents and carers in the school community
- Give individual classes the opportunity to share learning experiences and/or perform for their peers in other classes with confidence and entertainment





- Give parents and members of the community an opportunity to see the achievement of individual students and classes being celebrated
- Disseminate information to members of the school community.

Supplementary Parental Involvement

In addition to these major areas of involvement, parents and carers can assist the school and their child in many other ways, eg attending assemblies, paying fees promptly, supporting fundraising activities, reading newsletters, attending carnivals, helping with homework and.... by asking your child about their school day. Remember, we are all working towards a common goal – helping your child be a successful, resilient learner and achieve their potential.

All available evidence concludes that positive parental engagement in learning improves academic achievement, wellbeing and productivity.

Tribes Creates our Positive School Culture

Tribes Learning Communities (TLC) is a process that maximises learning and human development. Through engaging in the *Tribes* (TLC) process, all students experience opportunities for healthy development so that each one has the knowledge, skills and resilience to be successful in a rapidly changing world. The Principal, Lisa Helenius, and a teacher, Mrs Kellie Colquhoun, are trained presenters and facilitate the *Tribes* (TLC) process.

To strengthen our *Tribes* (TLC) culture, Rapids Landing Primary School will begin the year with a weekly focus for classes on each of the *Tribes* (TLC) Community Agreements: Mutual Respect, Attentive Listening, Personal Best/Personal Responsibility, Appreciations/No Put Downs and Right to Participate/Right to Pass. The agreements will be explicitly taught and displayed in poster form in classes throughout the year, where the language of the agreements is modelled by all staff.

Tribes (TLC) promotes a safe, supportive and inclusive teaching and learning environment at Rapids Landing Primary School and underpins all that we do.

These values will be actively taught and reinforced to support positive relationships between all members of the school community. The basis for student values and attitudes is the home, and parents are the primary educators. In the school, it is the teacher's role to teach and the students role to learn, both supported by parents and carers.

All staff members work together to ensure a consistent and fair approach in the management of our learning environment. Staff members are supported by clear and concise policy in the management of behaviour and bullying. These policies are proactive and positive in their intent utilising the research-based frameworks.

Positive Behaviours

Rapids Landing Primary School is committed to meeting the behavioural and social-emotional needs of individuals, whilst recognising the rights of others in a safe, caring, inclusive and positive school environment.

Our behaviour management policy focuses on rewarding and reinforcing desirable behaviour, and providing appropriate support for undesirable behaviour. It is based on the Positive Behaviour Support framework and provides clear school and classroom behaviour expectations with fair and appropriate consequences, which are applied consistently and equitably.





The school strongly supports all students and staff to feel safe as they learn and teach. Bullying is not tolerated at our school. Students are encouraged to report all acts of bullying so that action can be taken. The Behaviour Management Policy includes a section on bullying – how to prevent it, and how we respond to it.

Our one school rule at Rapids Landing Primary School is

Students respectfully move and play safely in supervised areas.

Students At Educational Risk

At Rapids Landing Primary School we have processes in place to identify and support students at educational risk to progress towards the achievement of their academic, behavioural and social-emotional goals. This process may involve the staff, parents and agencies working together to develop, implement and monitor Individual Education and/or Behaviour using plans to address the specific needs of the child.

Attendance Career

The School Education Act 1999 requires children of compulsory school age Pre-Primary – Year 6 to attend school. When a child is unable to attend, legislation requires that parents and carers forward written notification providing a reasonable cause for the absence of their child. We encourage you to notify us on the morning of the absence by phoning, using SchoolStream app or emailing the school. At this time, we will note the absence on our system. If a phone call or electronic explanation is not provided, a note explaining the absence is requested on return to school.

When notification is not received within three days of the original day's absence, the class teacher will send a letter requesting an explanation.

If students are late three (3) times in a five (5) week period, the Associate Principal will make contact with parents and carers to support their child attend school.

Leave Pass

Parents or carers collecting children prior to the end of the school day are required to complete a Leave Pass at the Administration Office before going to the classrooms.

Canteen

A P&C canteen committee will be established as soon as possible and parents will be notified when canteen services become available. In our foundation year, we offered a canteen service one day a week on a Wednesday through online ordering. We expect this to continue in 2021.

Dental Care

Rapids Landing Primary School students have access to the Dental Therapy Clinic located in the building next to the Administration Office.





School Dress Code

We encourage Rapids Landing Primary School students to wear the school uniform and a school hat throughout the year. Wearing school uniform develops a sense of pride in our school, raises our profile in the community and assists with maintaining a positive tone. A very dedicated Steering Committee helped staff to work through the complex task of determining our amazing school uniform, including a reversible sun smart hat. Children are required to wear their hat when they are playing outside of the classroom. At Rapids Landing Primary School we have a *Have hat, will play in the sun* policy.



Uniform order forms outline our uniform options and show images of our products. Prices and ordering details are also included and orders can be placed at any time at the Administration Office. Please ensure your child wears appropriate shoes and minimal, if any, jewellery to and from school. For health and safety reasons, all students are encouraged to tie their hair back, if it is shoulder length or longer.

Remember to label ALL clothing, including socks and shoes, with your child's full name. Students will keep their shoes on for most activities including outdoor play. As we are encouraging independence, we would appreciate shoes your child can manage independently

Health and Medication

It is important that you keep your child at home if they are ill as it is hard to learn when you are feeling poorly and an unwell child can be infectious to others. If your child feels unwell at school, we will contact parents and carers and request that they take their child home.

It is essential that the school be informed promptly of all changes to address, doctor, telephone and emergency contact numbers to ensure speedy notification of parents/carers if an emergency arises.

If your child requires medication throughout the school day, it is necessary for you to fill out and sign a medical administration form. Please see the Administration Office for more information.

Medication Conditions and Allergies

A list of students with specific allergies is kept at school. Please advise the Administration Office if your child suffers from asthma, allergies or other medical conditions. The school requires written information on all medicines. If your child is on medication, please complete a medical form at the Administration Office and ensure it is kept up to date. The school will need a copy of an action plan provided by your family doctor if your child is asthmatic, has anaphylaxis or suffers from other conditions that may require attention by staff.

Medication (eg antibiotics, analgesics) is not to be kept in children's school bags. Prescribed medication is to be brought to the Administration Office and a medical form completed by parents and carers.

Medication will only be administered with full written instructions from parents and carers.





Infectious Diseases

There are Department of Education requirements for infectious diseases. Following is a list of the most common ailments that children can suffer with. Details regarding treatment and possible exclusion from school are listed below. These exclusion periods can be altered if supported by a Medical Certificate. Please contact the Administration Office if you have any questions.

Head Lice

Head Lice (nits) are a common problem in schools. Small white egg sacks, which will look like whitish specks, can be observed stuck to hair, especially behind the ear and back of neck. If your child has head lice please treat their hair and remove all eggs and lice. Please follow the QR code for The Government of Western Australia, Department of Health's fact sheet on head lice.





Personal Growth and Development:


Personal growth and development, including puberty and sexuality, are part of the Health Curriculum.

Notes will be sent home to inform parents and carers when courses occur. If parents and carers have any concerns regarding the course, they should contact the class teacher or Principal.

Skin Protection:

The school fully supports the WA Health Department in its effort to make students fully aware of skin cancer.

1. The dangers of over-exposure to the sun are taught as part of the health program.
2. We encourage Rapids Landing Primary School students to wear a school hat throughout the year. A reversible sun smart hat is part of the uniform. Students are required to wear their hat when they are playing outside of the classroom. At Rapids Landing Primary School we have a *Have hat, will play in the sun* policy.
3. We strongly encourage students to regularly apply sun screen.



Psychologists

A School Psychologist is based at our school each fortnight and provides support for those students who may have educational, behavioural or emotional needs. Parents and carers wishing to utilise this service should contact their child's teacher, Principal or the Learning Support Coordinator.

Student Health and Well Being

• Dogs

Parents, carers and visitors are requested to not bring dogs on the school grounds during school hours. This includes being left unattended and tied to a boundary fence. You may know your dog is well trained and is unlikely to harm a child, however, schools are busy places where unpredictable events may trigger unexpected behaviours. Many children are fearful of dogs and some children may be allergic to them. We appreciate that families walk to school with their dogs, however, please make arrangements for dogs to remain outside the school grounds when taking your child to their classroom. Regardless of size or breed, it is inappropriate to bring dogs onto school grounds and I strongly ask you to respect this request.

• Scooters, Skateboards and Bikes

Students may ride their “Wheels” to school. In the interests of safety, we have expectations for them to follow:

- Bicycles, skateboards or scooters are **not** to be ridden on the school grounds.
- Legislation exists that requires all cyclists, including children in Western Australia, to wear helmets.
- It is recommended that children under the age of ten do not ride bicycles unsupervised.
- Bicycles, skateboards and scooters must be kept in the bike/wheels racks provided. They are **not** permitted to be stored in classrooms or with school bags.
- Students bring these items to school at their own risk. They are strongly encouraged to secure bicycles, skateboards and scooters with a lockable chain.
- The school takes no responsibility if these items are stolen or damaged.

Any form of transport, including bikes, scooters and skateboards, must be wheeled or carried on school grounds. This includes pathways into and throughout our school.

• No Smoking

Parents and visitors are asked to adhere to the Department of Education Policy prohibiting smoking on school grounds.

Parking

Designated parking bays are sign posted and we appreciate you parking in appropriate areas. Thank you for helping us promote the safe entry and exit to school for our whole school community....and the residents who live close to our buildings.

Parking for parents and visitors is available in the car embayment parking located along Hudsbeth Way. There are a small number of parking bays available for early childhood students located off Hudsbeth Way near Three Bears teaching block.



Staff, Disabled, Dental Therapy, Deliveries and authorised visitor parking areas have been designated in the Tonkin Boulevard car park.



The bus signage near the basketball courts helps you know when it is ok to park in this area (not between 7.30-9.00am and 2.30-4.00pm).



Rangers have advised that the red asphalt areas in the centre of Tonkin Blvd are not for parking - they are median strips. In the interests of public safety, please park in the bays and carparks provided. No Standing signs have now been installed.





Curriculum and Programs

Academic Measures

The early identification of the individual needs of students is critical to ensure they learn successfully. During each stage of schooling a number of measures are employed to identify the educational needs of students.

- Kindergarten – The teacher discusses any concerns with parents in relation to hearing, sight, speech and or physical development to enable parents to access specialist health professional intervention if necessary. Kindergarten children will participate in language screening which assesses foundation skills important to language development in the early years of schooling. The data from this assessment helps inform the Kindergarten and Pre-Primary literacy program for the year. It also identifies children requiring additional support and/or intervention. This screening is useful for all students and provides the school with valuable whole school data.
- Pre-Primary to Year 2 – Making sure our early years students have the necessary essential skills for future literacy and numeracy development is vitally important. All public schools in Western Australia are involved in the Department of Education’s On-Entry Assessment Program. This program, presented as a literacy and numeracy interview, will enable teachers to collect vital information on essential literacy and numeracy skills of their Pre-Primary, Year 1 and Year 2 children.

The results of these interviews will provide teachers with additional information to assist in the planning of their teaching programs, reflective of each student’s needs. It will also provide your child and teacher with some valuable time together in a one-to-one situation.

The Literacy interview takes approximately 30 minutes and includes a series of simple tasks, some of which have accompanying resources, and include speaking and listening, letter recognition, responding to sounds, and looking at books. The numeracy interview takes approximately 20 – 25 minutes and includes a set of simple tasks on number, measurement and space.

- Years 3 to 6 – Ongoing monitoring and assessment of your child’s progress using a range of standardised tests and summative assessment to plan for and implement teaching strategies to meet their individual needs.

In addition to monitoring that occurs at a school level, students also participate in national testing procedures. The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment of all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. All students are expected to participate in the testing. They will be assessed in language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation), writing, reading and numeracy.

The results support schools to identify strengths and areas that need adjustment in teaching programs, and gain information to help them evaluate programs and allocate resources.





Reporting to Parents

As part of accountability requirements, regular reporting to parents and feedback on student progress is an important, non-negotiable, requirement of the school. A variety of methods are utilised each term to keep parents and carers informed about their child's progress.

Parent and caregivers will receive formal reports twice a year. These reports comply with Department of Education requirements to:

- give an accurate and objective assessment of the student's progress and achievement
- include an assessment of the student's achievement reported as an ABCDE scale, clearly defined against specific learning standards and relative to the student's peer group.

Other forms of reporting include Progress Packs, Three-Way-Conferences and Learning Journeys.

Gifted and Talented

Rapids Landing Primary School provides challenging and broad curriculum content and a diverse co-curricular program to cater for all students. We also have a focus on identifying talents in the Arts, Physical Education and developing Critical and Creative Thinking skills in all children.

In addition to school based programs, students are tested in Year 4 for participation in external classes through Primary Extension and Challenge (PEAC) in Years 5-6. PEAC is a part time program in which students are provided with extension opportunities. Identified students are selected to participate in programs offered in a range of delivery modes. It is the parent's responsibility to transport their child to classes, if required.

Rapids Landing Primary School students will be identified for inclusion in these programs.

Rapids Landing Primary School provides the PEAC program for our region.

Teachers take into account the different experiences and backgrounds of children, and tailor programs to meet their learning needs.

Homework

Homework reinforces and supports the things your children learn at school. It is designed to get your children thinking and applying what they learn in different ways and encourages them to become independent learners. Many students, as they progress through schooling, come to regard homework as a normal and necessary extension of the day's learning activities.

Homework may take a variety of forms. The important factor is that any homework must provide educative experiences. Homework should centre around the interests of the child which may be natural or acquired and add to their interest in learning. We encourage children undertake voluntary tasks to make use of their acquired skills in a way appropriate to their age and interests. Targeted activities may form part of this experience as part of an Individual Support Plan.

Children should be encouraged to read or be read to each day for interest and enjoyment. Books can be borrowed from the school Library.

Homework can range from arithmetical puzzles for the child who enjoys working in this area, to another finding satisfaction in writing real letters to friend, or yet others who are naturally interested in the media or collecting things – at first indiscriminately and later for rarity, identification, classifications or exhibition purpose.

Precise tasks given to all members of a class to be performed out of school hours and marked by the classroom teacher is not supported by our school policy.

Parents and carers may discuss with the teacher the opportunity or necessity for their child to opt out of any homework activities in the short term or longer duration. Please see the Rapids Landing Homework Policy for more details. Please remember, homework should be viewed as a positive learning and reinforcement opportunity.





Information Communication Technology

Rapids Landing Primary School is equipped with the latest in computer technology to support student learning. Your child will learn to use contemporary information and communication technologies, including interactive whiteboards, desktop computers, notebooks, coding devices, iPads and cameras that will support their learning and provide them with access to current information and contemporary models of learning. Rapids Landing Primary School promotes all students to be active citizens in their world.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics)

Being 21st century learners, students' curiosity and their appetite to learn new knowledge will be encouraged at Rapids Landing Primary School.

STEM education is the learning of science, technology, engineering and mathematics in an interdisciplinary or integrated approach. Students gain and apply knowledge, deepen their understanding and develop creative and critical thinking skills within an authentic context. It may include inquiry and project or problem based learning. Our school is a STEM Enterprise School, a Department of Education initiative.

A vibrant capacity in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) is pivotal to increasing our nation's productivity.

Library

We have a spacious, state of the art Library that is accessible to all students. The Library is resourced with award-winning fiction and non-fiction books that students will be strongly encouraged to borrow and read, both at home and at school.

Physical Education

The school has a Physical-Education teacher who will develop skills and undertake a range of programs developing students' fundamental movement skills, organised sport programs and dance, as well as inter-faction sporting activities and carnivals. Students who show skills or interest may also have the opportunity to participate in inter-school sport competitions. This program aims to develop in each student, skills, fitness and a positive attitude to be able to live and enjoy a healthy, active lifestyle.

Students from Pre-primary to Year 6 also participate in the Department of Education's swimming lesson program during the year. This is comprised of 9 or 10 lessons conducted over a two week period.

The Arts

Opportunities are provided for children to express their artistic talents. This includes performance, competitions and exhibitions in the domains of Music, Visual and Performing Arts. Children are encouraged to learn through the Arts and develop their creativity through a variety of media. Specialist teachers in Visual Arts, Music and Drama support student learning in this area.

Excursions and Incursions

Excursions and incursions play an important part in the learning program of all classes. Written permission is required for excursions and failure to return the excursion permission slip by the due date will result in the child not participating. This will be strictly adhered to for risk management purposes.

Factions

Our factions for sport and other team experiences are named after the spectacular caves in the Margaret River Region, with the idea coming from community consultation. Initially, Rapids Landing Primary School will open with three factions:

Jewel (green)

Lakes (purple)

Mammoth (orange)

As our school grows in student numbers, Ngilgi (yellow) will join the faction names.

Collection of Children

During School Hours:

- In certain circumstances, such as illness, medical appointments, etc, it may be necessary to collect children from school during school hours. Parents and carers are required to complete **Passtab** (an electronic sign in and out process) and receive a leave pass at the Administration Office before picking up child/ren from their classroom/s. This is a necessary legal requirement for reasons of safety and duty of care.
- **Passtab** process is also used by any adult who enters our school grounds.

After School Hours:

- At times, parents can be unavoidably detained, causing them to be late when collecting their children from school. In such instances, please phone the school, so that supervision arrangements can be made.

Late to School

If your child arrives after 9.15am, please bring them to the Administration Office to sign them in. We are always happy to see our students, so please bring them to school even if you are running a little late.

Custody of Children

Please provide copies of court orders to the Principal at time of enrolment. If in the future there are any changes to the orders it is very important that you inform the Principal.

Confidential Declarations/Police Clearance

Departmental regulations state that any parents/carers/community members who are involved in activities with other students in the school must sign a Confidential Declaration that they have no criminal record that would deem them detrimental to students. Parents/Carers/Community members involved in the school need to sign these. Forms are available from the Administration Office or teachers.

Working With Children Declarations

Working With Children's Clearance is required for parent and carer helpers who assist with overnight camps. These forms are available from the Post Office.

Internet, Information Privacy and Security

All students access and use the internet under supervision whilst at school. When enrolling your child, you will be required to sign a permission form granting rights to access the internet whilst at school.

Department of Education policy requires written permission before photos of your child/ren can be used on printed material such as newsletters, newspapers, television, video and/or internet. Formal enrolment documentation requests parent authorisation/permission for this to occur.





Mobile Phones

From 2020, all public schools must implement a ban on the use of mobile phones for students from the time they arrive at school until the end of the school day - including before school and at break times.

This policy applies to all principals of public schools.

So what does this mean for Rapids Landing PS? The biggest change was where we had permitted students to have them switched off and stored in their bag or with the teacher, we now must ensure that we store all devices.

Students who bring mobile phones and other digital devices not permitted under the Department of Education's Policy to school will immediately attend the Administration Office upon entering the school premises and provide their device to Office staff. They will be provided with a tag to show receipt of the device and have it stored in a secure box. At the end of the school day, students return to the Administration Office with their tag and receive their device.

Parents needing to make emergency contact with their children during school hours are requested to do so through Administration Office.

NB: Neither the school nor the Department of Education will accept any responsibility if mobile phones or other items are lost, damaged or stolen.

Personal Belongings

Students are asked not to bring along valuables such as iPods, mobile phones, consoles, gaming devices, jewellery, electronic toys or money that can be mislaid or damaged during school hours. If brought to school, electronic items must be switched off and stored in bags. No responsibility will be accepted for valuables of this nature.

Lost Property

Containers of lost property such as clothing will be located outside the Administration Office.

We ask for your assistance by ensuring that all personal belongings are clearly labelled with your child's name to assist us to be able to return items misplaced by children within the school grounds.

School Information - Frequently Asked Questions

What do children learn at Primary School?

Students learn an amazing amount as their learning journey continues through primary school.

Primary school education continues in Years 1 to 6 where children receive a strong foundation in eight core subject areas:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- Humanities and Social Sciences
- Technologies
- Languages
- The Arts
- Health and Physical Education

Literacy and **numeracy** are important learning areas. Learning focuses on ensuring your children understand mathematics and learn to read and write competently. Our staff have specialist literacy and numeracy teachers to help your children develop these important skills.

Programs are designed to build natural curiosity and foster inquiring minds in the area of **Science and Technology**. In **Humanities and Social Sciences**, they learn about the history and traditions at the heart of Australia's democratic society.

Teachers plan for a balance of activities based on the learning needs of your children and other children in their class. In some instances, specialist teachers teach the class, for example in Physical Education and The Arts (Visual Arts, Drama and Music).

Your child's teacher takes into account their experiences and background to make sure learning programs meet your child's needs. If your child is having difficulty with any of the learning, speak with their teacher.

What food should my child bring?

At Rapids Landing Primary School we follow the Department of Education's Healthy Food and Drink Policy.

Your child is strongly encouraged to bring healthy food and drinks to school. A typical lunchbox may consist of:

- 1 bottle of water
- 1 - 2 pieces of fresh fruit, raw vegetable sticks or healthy food, eg cheese. Pre-Primary students will have the opportunity to drink water and snack on fruits or vegetables and this is often referred to as "Crunch & Sip."
- A packed lunch. Please keep it simple and nutritious. **A sandwich, wrap or salad** will be encouraged to be eaten first. Then children may have **an additional piece of fruit/ vegetable and a small snack**. (Popcorn, yoghurt, cheese and crackers, etc, are appropriate snacks). You may like to include a frozen ice pack to ensure lunch stays cool and safe to eat. There are many websites that offer healthy lunchbox ideas. The following link is one example.

- **We encourage you, where possible, to avoid nuts and egg products in lunches due to the potential of children having allergies.**





What do students do at recess and lunch?

Years 1 – 6 Recess

- Food must be consumed while seated in the courtyard area.
- Students dismiss themselves to play after they have finished eating and have placed rubbish in the bin.

Years 1-6 Lunch

- Food must be consumed while seated in the courtyard area.
- Students are to remain seated until dismissed at 1.30pm.
- Students place rubbish in bins prior to play.

Wet weather arrangements exist for recess and lunch.

How can we assist Rapids Landing Primary School?

The development of children is a shared responsibility between the school and parents and carers. You can assist our school and your child's educational development by:

- Being on time to drop off and pick up from school.
- Ensuring that all absences are explained.
- Notifying the Principal if you plan on being away for an extended period (more than 3 school days).
- Discouraging your child from bringing electronics and toys to school (unless requested by the teacher).
- Helping your child wear school appropriate clothing and minimal, if any, jewellery.
- Promptly reading, signing and returning (if necessary) all forms and notes.
- Routinely read the school newsletter and any other notices that may be displayed or sent home.
- Keeping up regular contact with your child's teacher. Any concerns (health, educational, family) should be discussed at your earliest convenience.
- Making a time in advance to privately discuss more lengthy and/or confidential matters.
- Please Note: Class meetings will be held by classroom teachers at the start of the school year. You will be informed of the date in advance. This meeting will give staff the opportunity to share their class policy and information specific to their classroom. There will be an opportunity to ask questions at the end of the meeting. This is also a good opportunity for parents and carers to meet and network with other parents and carers.
- Ask your child about their day and be a partner in their learning.





Why is attending school every day so important?

Western Australian law stipulates that all school-aged children must go to and attend school every day.

Developing the habit of going to school every day is vital so children do not miss out on important ideas and skills they need for future learning. Did you know:

- missing half a day of school each week equates to one month of missed learning per year
- the attendance habits set by children when they first start school continue throughout their school life
- if your children miss half a day of school each week between Pre-Primary and Year 10, they would miss almost one full year of learning
- learning is cumulative – if your children miss a day, it is harder for them to catch up.

You can help by arriving and collecting your children on time; making sure they get nutritious meals and enough sleep; and making appointments with doctors, dentists and specialists, and making holiday plans during school holidays and not during the school term.

If one of your children is unwell and unable to go to school, let the school know straight away by telephone or by the school app. If they miss a day it is important you talk with their teacher to find out how you can help them catch up, if needed.
